Overview of student substance use research

- No consistent student drug and alcohol use research prior to SOS-UK in the UK. Evidence was institution-specific, anecdotal, and varied hugely
 - National Union of Students (NUS) & Release Taking the Hit research in 2018 - not a prevalence study
 - Drug Use in Higher Education in Ireland survey in 2021 (DUHEI) students in Ireland only
 - Alcohol research tends to focus on young people more broadly, or younger age groups e.g. 11-15 year olds







Introduction to the SOS-UK Students, Drugs and Alcohol Survey


- Survey runs each year as part of Drug and Alcohol Impact and Alcohol Impact programmes
- Designed to identify students' relationship with alcohol and drugs, with the aim of providing a
 means to understand changes in attitudes and behaviours of students
- Survey is promoted at the start of each academic year through universities and students'
 unions to the students and through the NUS TOTUM cardholder database responses from
 students studying in HE across the UK, including institutions participating in our programmes
- Institutions who promote the survey and receive 100 or more responses from their students are
 eligible to receive a copy of the data for their students taking part in SOS-UK's programmes
 isn't compulsory to be part of the research
- 4069 HE student respondents for 2023-24 survey report published in the coming weeks
- The 2024-25 survey will run from November 18th December 8th



Key findings 2023-24 Drugs




21% of students report currently using drugs

Q. And now you're a student at university/college, which of the following best matches your experiences of drug use? [Base: 3942 Balance: No response]







Where do students who access advice and information about drugs get their information from?







Respondents say they haven't used the drug information and advice services offered by their university/students' union due to accessing support elsewhere, not believing it would meet their needs and not being aware of the support available




Q. Which of the following reasons best describes why you haven't used drug information and advice services offered by your university/students' union? Base: see graph Balance: No response



Key findings 2023-24 Alcohol




Just over a quarter of respondents told us they don't currently drink alcohol, two fifths drink once a week or more




Reported impacts during or following alcohol use...

related to academic work		related to crime and antisocial behaviour	
38%	report missing a university seminar/lecture/class	18% report getting into an argument with people they know	
26%	report arriving late to a university seminar/lecture/class	14% report getting into an argument with strangers	
18%	report missing social engagements	5% causing damage to the place they live	
related to health		related to social behaviour	
14%	report an existing mental health condition becoming worse	report being unable to remember what happened the night before	
7 %	report an improvement in their day-to-day experience with an existing mental health condition	report experiencing unwanted sexual attention from a stranger or someone they know	
4%	report an existing physical health condition becoming worse	27% report injuring themselves	



We found that 44% of students aren't aware of any campaigns relating to safe or responsible drinking at their place of study



Q. Are you aware of any safe or responsible drinking campaigns, projects or activities at your university? Weighted base: 3904 Balance: No response, Other




Collecting and using your data



Why & how to use institutional/local data in drug and alcohol work

Why?

- Provides local context
- Respond to trends
- Identify groups with most risk
- Targeted interventions & communications





Collecting data on campus

You possibly already collect:

- Anonymous data from student services
- Incident reports from residences
- Anecdotal reports of drug or alcohol issues
- Sales of alcohol and non-alcoholic drinks at venues on campus
- Drug and alcohol use in wellbeing surveys or focused events

New sources of data:

- Social media polls
- Focus groups
- Surveys
- Local drug and alcohol services/partners who collect local data
